






# Dear Readers,

The war in Syria is heading into its fifth year, and it seems many of us have become accustomed to the horrifying pictures coming out of the Middle East. The emotionally loaded debate regarding Austria's refugee policy only makes matters worse. It's so easy to lose sight of the incredible number of human tragedies that each humanitarian catastrophe leaves in its wake. CARE's work is dedicated to supporting those who have lost everything to war and persecution. We are committed not only to ensuring their survival, but to creating perspectives for the future and viable opportunities for employment. This is why Syria and its neighboring countries remain one of CARE Austria's focal points.

The past year was marked by numerous chronic trouble spots. South Sudan, where thousands of people live in camps under inhumane conditions, has been on the verge of humanitarian catastrophe for quite some time. Food is scarce, because the conflict prevents crops from being cultivated. Thousands flee to poor neighboring countries, where they depend on humanitarian aid from organizations like CARE. **Burundi** is plagued by a significant political crisis as a result of presidential elections and related claims to power. Riots, plundering, and demonstrations continue on a regular basis. The conflict has already claimed the lives of **hundreds of victims**.

It seems almost unbelievable that the singer **Eva Lind** gave a benefit concert for CARE in Bujumbura as recently as the fall of 2014. For years, CARE has been working in Burundi to strengthen the economic situation for women and improve education for children and former child soldiers who have a hard time readjusting to everyday village life. On page 10, Eva Lind shares impressions from her trip to Burundi.

While we were putting together this annual report, another catastrophe occurred: the **devastating earth-quake in Nepal** that cost the lives of thousands and left millions with nothing. **Again, CARE's work proved necessary for survival**. CARE employees saved lives, distributed CARE packages with bare necessities, spread hope, and worked with the Nepalese population on rebuilding efforts that will continue for years.

We are reaching out to you, our valued supporters and donors, once again. Your financial support is urgently needed: this year, CARE celebrates 70 years of aid – and the support provided by the CARE package is now more important than ever.

Together, we can **ensure CARE's continued aid**. As long as you remain engaged when you see pictures of war or natural catastrophes, CARE can continue to work, help, and alleviate human suffering.



Although Muzoon is only 16 years old, she is well acquainted with the horrors of war. She lives in the Azraq refugee camp in Jordan, where she is fighting against child marriage – with pencils and paper! In other words: with education.

The determined young woman explains the moment when it became clear to her that nothing is more important than education: "When we left Syria, I could only take a backpack with me. I couldn't decide what to pack. My father put his arm around me and said it didn't matter. "Everything you need is in here", he said, indicating my forehead. That's when I realized: no matter what happens, no one can take away your education."

Muzoon is one of so many who have lost their homes and possessions. The war in Syria has long entangled the Middle East and its inhabitants: approximately 12 million people in and around Syria are in need of assistance. 2014 was a bleak year.

 In the spring the number of refugees in Lebanon surpassed a million. In April, the Azraq camp for refugees from Syria, where CARE works, opened in Jordan. As of spring 2015, 19,000 people live there.

- In the summer the number of Syrian refugees in neighboring countries reached an all-time high of three million.
- In the fall thousands of refugees crossed the border to Turkey and fled from the city Kobane.
   CARE's team in Turkey distributed mattresses, blankets, heaters, and other necessary items.
- In the winter the United Nations World Food Programme announced that the supply of food rations to refugees would be interrupted due to a lack of funds.

To date, **only one third** of CARE's **emergency assistance** in the region has been **financed**. We are working tirelessly in cooperation with other humanitarian organizations and the United Nations, but the unceasing flood of refugees remains an immense humanitarian and financial challenge. There is no end in sight.



# Escaped from hell, stranded in the middle of nowhere


Hundreds of thousands of Syrians have sought refuge in Jordan. Many of them are stranded in enormous reception camps in the middle of the desert, where they eke out an existence between survival and hopelessness.

Azraq – a trip to nowhere. In the middle of the barren stone desert in northern Jordan, about 90 kilometers from the Syrian border, thousands of sheet metal shacks glimmer in the blistering sun. A fence, policed by the Jordanian military, surrounds the approximately 15 square kilometer terrain.

At the Azraq refugee camp, CARE provides psychosocial support for the often **severely traumatized refugees**. Courses in conflict management and education are also available, and newcomers receive information about the structure and services at the

camp, and about their rights as camp residents. CARE maintains urban **refugee centers** in the cities of Amman, Irbid, Mafraq and Zarqa. Here, one-time cash assistance for the purchase of bare necessities is provided to those who are no longer able to support themselves. Social workers provide emotional assistance, giving preference to those in special need, including **pregnant women**. Syrian refugees in Jordan also provide volunteer assistance on the project.

Azraq was opened in 2014, and should accommodate up to 130,000 refugees. The refugees here live together in village-like structures. CARE employees run community centers, where those in need receive psychosocial support, children have space to play, and women find a safe haven. Up to 200 new refugees arrive at Azraq every day. Around 50 percent are children; 20 percent are under the age of five.



Although refugee camps ensure refugee survival, life in the desert barracks is marked by hardship. The sparse huts lack electricity, and the likelihood of new beginnings outside of the camps decreases as the conflict rages on. Outside of the camps, Syrians don't receive work permits.

"I was a teacher in Deraa. Assad's troops took everything. They broke into our houses, destroyed our schools and infrastructure. I was forced to flee with my pregnant wife", explains Mohammad al-Salan. Like most people here, he dreams of returning to his home. But hopes for a quick return to Syria have long been dashed. "I don't see a future for us. Everything is ruined, nothing remains", says Manal, mother of five children. Only her 12 year old daughter Sedra hangs on to her dream: she wants to be a doctor.

Millions of Syrians are fleeing. Many seek safety in Syria, and many have fled to neighboring countries. They cross borders—to Jordan, for example—, arriving exhausted, fearful, and with nothing, after a month-long odyssey by foot.

Hundreds of thousands of Syrian refugees live here - no one knows exactly how many. The majority lives in villages and cities in the border regions, fighting for survival, unable to afford rent or food. The worst fate is suffered by women who are alone with their children.

Humanitarian organizations like CARE support refugees, but those who have experienced the horrors of war will carry the memories with them for the rest of their lives.



# Connecting People: Personal Support

The sponsorship project Connecting People facilitates person to person refugee support in Austria. Sponsorship includes accompanying a refugee and building a personal relationship with him or her, learning together, sharing free time, and providing security. The young refugees, ages 15 to 18, come from Afghanistan, East Africa, and increasingly from wartorn Syria. They fled to Austria without their parents in hopes of protection and an opportunity to create a better life. Connecting People sponsors help make this possible. Prospective sponsors are prepared for this very important role in groups of about twenty.

Finally, the long-awaited moment arrives: the young refugees meet their sponsors for the first time. Excitement and shyness, predominant emotions in the first few moments, soon give way to fondness. Over time, the pairs take important steps together – from learning German and pursuing an education to identifying an appropriate occupation.

The **Connecting People** team accompanies the sponsors for a year, facilitates the exchange of experiences, provides information, and helps when problems arise. A large number of people express interest in becoming sponsors, but financial constraints mean that only two sponsor groups per year can be trained, paired, and supported. **CARE supports an additional group every year** – enabling 20 additional sponsorships to provide sustainable assistance for 20 youth.

Since the end of 2013, when the conflict in South Sudan broke out, **2 million people have fled** their homes. Forced to leave everything behind, they are unable to plant crops. Hunger threatens almost four million people. **675,000 children** show signs of undernourishment, and 250,000 are severely malnourished. Without assistance from organizations like CARE, they would not survive. CARE International works tirelessly to provide medical assistance, supplementary nutrition for undernourished children, basic sanitation, seeds, and other relief supplies.

## Pregnant women and children suffer the most from the lack of food.

Nyanyin Jek, seven months pregnant, marched two days through the swamp to receive medical assistance at a CARE health center. "On the way I ate only leaves, because I didn't have any food to bring with me", she explains. And there is no food for her children, either. "We eat sorghum only once a day". It was even worse around the time she fled, since fighting broke out near her village. "We had nothing to eat but a few leaves and fruit. I was so scared. I hid my children in the grass when soldiers passed by", Nyanyin reports.

In order for people to recreate a livelihood for themselves, they need to be able to grow their own vegetables again. With help from CARE, they can plant sorghum, peas, sesame, watermelon, tomatoes, onions, eggplant, and okra. "We hope that these seeds help families to get back on their feet", explains Mujahid Hussain, CARE's program coordinator.

Nyanyin received medical assistance and began her long journey home. Her hopes for a better life have been dashed. Many people in South Sudan feel the same way: "After South Sudan gained independence in 2011, we were hopeful about the future. But this conflict is horrible. We are all human beings, and we don't deserve this suffering."



# South Sudan

Founded in 2011, South Sudan is the world's youngest nation.



Since December 2013, all hopes for this country have been dashed by violence; the country remains torn by civil war.

Around **2 million people** have been forced to leave their homes since the beginning of the conflict.

Around 1.5 million people are displaced within their country, having fled violence and hunger. More than 500,000 have found refuge in neighboring countries.

**Many children** who reach refugee settlements with their families face life-threatening malnourishment.


**CARE** provides assistance in the areas of nourishment, medical support, and hygiene. Soap and latrines play an important role in preventing the spread of illnesses.

CARE hopes to provide assistance to 600,000 people in South Sudan.



# Floods in the Balkans: "Not even one potato remained"

The Halilovic family lives off of four dairy cows they received from CARE. With them, Mirsada, the 36 year old mother, earns around EUR 100 per month. Usually this is sufficient to support her family of four, but not this year. Even the hay was flooded and subsequently rotted, and couldn't be used to feed the cows.



The Halilovic family doesn't know how they will survive the coming months. "Not even one potato remained after the floods", says Mirsada. The Halilovic family is a Roma family – although it could have been any family – but Roma families

are often particularly vulnerable to weather conditions or authorities. Roma organizations such as "For a better future" in Tuzla are committed to helping victims of the flood. One successful program distributes cows, sheep, or hens to women so that they can begin farming.



**Eva Lind, the well-known Tyrolean opera singer**, has been supporting CARE for quite some time. She is passionate about providing assistance for children and young people. This past fall, Eva Lind traveled to Burundi to experience a CARE project there first hand.

#### **CARE: Why do you support CARE?**

**Eva Lind:** Supporting CARE's very important projects is a cause that is very dear to me, because they have a sustainable impact in their respective countries and provide comprehensive assistance for people there.

In November you traveled to Burundi with CARE Austria. What are the goals of the project you visited there?

The project aims to provide the many disadvantaged youth in that country with a better start in life. The CARE team is committed to helping people help themselves: the youth learn how to manage conflict and how to successfully steer their lives.

#### What were you most impressed by?

I met Japhet, an 18 year old albino. Normally, an albino in Burundi has very little chance of surviving. People exclude and avoid them; some albinos are even killed. Thanks to CARE's project, Japhet has not

only survived and been integrated in the group, but was elected to be a group leader. My encounter with him made a huge impression on me, and his positive approach to life brought me immense happiness.

You gave a benefit concert in the capital city of Bujumbura. What are some of your impressions from this special event?

It was pure joy! The joint concert with the Bujumbura Choir was an unforgettable experience. The musicality of the people there is simply amazing, and the European classical music I performed with two pianists from Burundi also opened hearts.


# Do you plan to continue your involvement with CARE?

Yes, definitely! In July I will travel to Africa, where I will perform at the Pan-African Choir Festival, and give a concert in Kenya to benefit CARE Austria's project for children in the slums of Kisumu.

# "Now I perform household tasks that used to be considered 'women's work"


The project "Berchi" ("Be strong!") supports disadvantaged women and men in the Ethiopian regions Amhara and Oromia in their efforts to create sustainable livelihoods. The project, which focuses on food security and climate change adaptation, is part of the program "Claiming rights – promoting gender equality", implemented by CARE Austria with support from the Austrian Development Agency (ADA). Traditional gender roles are also challenged and transformed.



Kese Tsedale Fenta: Our family has stopped dividing up the household chores. In our analysis and action group, we talked about the roles that are traditionally assigned to men and women. My wife and I enjoy a more fulfilled life because we often talk about how we want to run our household together. I'm glad that I can explain the benefits of sharing responsibility and jointly running the household with my community and the members of our church.



Tazebe Yibka: My son attends university in Debre Tabor. My wife used to prepare his meals for him to take home, because we believed that men shouldn't cook. After several meetings in our action group, my wife and I asked him to cook for himself. At first he wasn't very happy about it. I've also learned to cook, but I definitely need more practice. Our son is more independent now that he can prepare his own meals.




**Geta Tibebu:** Now I perform household tasks that used to be considered 'women's work', like bake our traditional flat bread Injera or make coffee. Our roles have changed: my daughter now helps plow the field. Since we share tasks, we can easily fill in for each other doing the laundry or field work if someone gets sick.

Throughout 2014, CARE has been developing its own internal and external sustainability agendas in a strategic and long-term process.

The sustainability team "Los Sostenibles" brings together employees from all departments. CARE's strategic process for sustainability is aligned with ISO 26000, the international guidelines for the implementation of sustainable development in organizations. The goal is to incorporate CARE's sustainability agendas in its management approach, and to continually improve upon them. Emphasis is placed on the areas of management, employees, human rights, the environment, consumer concerns, and inclusion/community development. In a first step, existing sustainability practices were recorded, and relevant topics and stakeholders were identified. The basis for achieving sustainable change within the Austrian CARE office was created by defining internal processes, responsible parties, and working group leaders.

The team identified stakeholders within the Vienna office and among other CARE members, including project partners, political and religious dignitaries in project countries, institutional donors, companies, and private donors – all of whom are instrumental for the success of CARE's core activities and for project beneficiaries. Suppliers, agencies, and the media were also identified as important interest groups. In the past, CARE kept in touch with stake holders through events, mailings, newsletters, donor surveys, and employee interviews. In the coming year, CARE will additionally launch targeted surveys and dialogues about CARE Austria's sustainability activities, and publish facts and figures on the CARE homepage and in the 2015 annual report.

CARE experienced success in 2014 through participation in the City of Vienna's eco-bonus program. CARE also **received** a Green Events Award from Andrä Rupprechter, Minister of the Environment, for the symposium "Climate change here and there. Who cares?".

### **CARE Campaigns**

Our 2014 campaign "Children in catastrophes" raised awareness for the situation of children in crisis regions. Unfortunately, it's often the youngest that are hardest hit by humanitarian crises like the one in Syria. At the end of 2014, we launched the new campaign "70 years of the CARE package", which will continue throughout our anniversary years 2015/16. Still today, CARE packages help to relieve distress and suffering in catastrophe and crisis zones all over the world. We are especially thankful for the pro bono support offered by the agencies Wien Nord and Media 1 for the conceptualization and implementation of these campaigns.
