## DEAR READERS,

has there ever been a topic impacting on us in the same overpowering way as the fight against the coronavirus? From the perspective of 2020, so thoroughly shaped by this global pandemic, the challenges of 2019, which are described in this Annual Report, may seem relatively minor. But we should not fool ourselves. A vaccination will be available against the coronavirus in the foreseeable future – and we are all keenly waiting for it. But what about the climate crisis, the big topic in 2019? How are we going to protect human beings from disastrous hurricanes, towering floods or blazing heat occurring ever more often, threatening or even ruining their existence?

Let’s take the devastations caused by cyclone Idai in Mozambique, for example. Although more than a year has passed since then, the hardship is still huge. Women and children, in particular, still are in urgent need of our help. In Chad, most plants cannot thrive anymore on the parched soil. CARE provides the population with training in new cultivation methods to achieve yields at least sufficient to save the families from acute poverty.

## “The storm has torn away our life”

**Mozambique is a sad example of what happens when climate change hits a country afflicted by poverty and need. Now, the coronavirus represents another danger threatening the country.**

“I grabbed my children and started to run,” Lucia Francisco (33) tells the emergency relief team of CARE. At the last minute, she manages to bring her family to safety. Idai is soon followed by the next natural disaster: hurricane Kenneth. And again, the water rises. Lucia and her six children lose everything in the floods: their home, their harvest, their clothes. The baby that Lucia is carrying is only six months old. “The storm has torn away our life,” says Lucia. **“Where am I supposed to find food for my children now?”**

The intensity and frequency of hurricanes in Mozambique have increased over the past years. **People already living in poverty are hit hard by the consequences of climate change.** The process of reconstruction is slow, even one year after the cyclones. Buildings are still without roofs, people are living in tents. They look tired.


An estimated 2.5 million people, i.e. almost 10 per cent of the population, depend on humanitarian aid, according to information provided by the United Nations. More than 1.6 million people do not have

enough food – and this number will increase even further in the months to come.

But why are people still suffering, more than one year after the crisis? Insufficient rainfall in the southern parts of Mozambique have caused poor harvests, so that hundreds of thousands of people still require life-saving aid even months after the hurricanes. **Humanitarian organizations like CARE can only cover the bare necessities – the extent of suffering is enormous.**

Already before the coronavirus crisis, the healthcare system of Mozambique was poorly structured and overstretched. The coronavirus outbreak has aggravated the situation even further. **How is COVID-19 going to affect people who are starving and living in temporary shelters with hardly any access to clean water?** Obviously, keeping a safe distance from others, thus minimizing the risk of infection, is hardly possible in camps.

What is CARE going to do? Give up? Abandon these people to their fate? Definitely not! CARE is going to do what we, as an aid organization, have been doing during any emergency for 75 years ever since our formation in 1945. CARE is going to provide emergency relief! In Mozambique alone, we have already provided support to more than 300,000 people. **More than ever before, CARE is needed in crises like climate catastrophes, famines and global pandemics.** And for CARE to be able to help, we need your donations! **Thank you very much!**



## ONE YEAR AFTER HURRICANE IDAI: "WE'VE GOT NOTHING AND WE ARE LIVING IN A TENT"

One year after hurricane Idai, Marta (photo) is clearly moved when she talks about that day in March 2019, when her existence was swept away. **"The water entered our house. I was afraid that the children might drown."** On the run, she put the baby in their only blanket. "I was afraid he might not survive. The storm was still raging. I had nothing to protect him."

**Baby Joaquim Augusto celebrates his first birthday under a tarpaulin.** The family is still homeless. Marta patiently queues in a long line of people who get building material from CARE, which is going to be used to build a new home for Marta and her three kids. She does not want to go back to the place where her former house was located. "It is safer here, because the village is higher up," she says.

### **SWEPT AWAY BY THE FLOODS**

But that also means that Marta needs to put up with long walks to get to the small piece of land where she is cultivating maize, tomatoes and onions. "I leave at four in morning and it takes me approximately

three hours to get there." The animals the family used to have were lost. **"The floods swept away our cows, goats and chicken,"** Marta says. She has to start from scratch to be able to feed her family. This is why mothers like Marta need our help!

### **FAMILIES NEED HELP**

"I depend on the harvest from the small piece of land and on what I get from the aid organizations," says Marta. **Day after day, she is struggling for baby Joaquim Augusto to have a better future.** So far, CARE has helped more than 300,000 people by providing food, drinking water, emergency shelters and drought-resistant seeds. CARE also provides hygiene products, tarpaulins, blankets, mosquito nets, sleeping mats and water cans. Mothers like Marta are counting on our support during reconstruction in Mozambique.

**But where to start when all is lost?** Lucia (photo on p. 7) has six children. Nothing is left of her house, her stocks, her belongings. A hut that is open on all sides, with a leaky roof – that is all Lucia and her children have.

**Marta**

**More than 100,000 people are in the same situation,** still living in emergency shelters one year after the catastrophe. Many of them are starving because the storms and floods have destroyed their fields and harvests. Animals like goats and chickens have drowned. **Women and children are bearing the brunt of the catastrophe.** Now they have to cope with considerably greater distances to get water and firewood. Many families were separated in the chaos following the hurricane; children could not go to school anymore.

**“I AM STRUGGLING TO FEED MY CHILD”**

There is no one but Feliciano (27) to look after her daughter (3). “We depend on the help we get. We have lost everything,” she says. Before the catastrophe, Feliciano used to bake and sell cakes. Now, she has no money left to buy the ingredients. She can’t find a job. Feliciano is grateful that she has got clothes for her little one. Feeding the child is often quite hard. **“We get rice and beans, but that does not last long. At the end of the month, we have nothing left.”**

Isabel (70) looks after her three grandchildren (photo), who have lost their parents. Their mother died during the hurricane under the debris of their house. **“Now I am all they got,”** says Isabel. The death of her daughter still gets to her. Isabel is too old to work, so her son must provide for the family alone. But it is hard for him, too, to find work in the village. “I am glad that we are getting food and support. Unfortunately, it seems to be getting less day after day,” says Isabel.

Her greatest wish is for her grandchildren to be able to go to school. She has got a message for the people in Austria who have donated for Mozambique: **“Please don’t forget us! My grandchildren need your help!”** For Lucia, Feliciano and Isabel, relief supplies are indispensable to survive. **Let’s not turn our backs on the women and children in Mozambique!**

## “CLIMATE CHANGE IS RUINING OUR LIVELIHOOD”

In Chad, almost two thirds of the population are living on less than one US dollar a day. The effects of climate change make their struggle to survive even harder. **There is a lack of water.** Due to droughts occurring more frequently and irregular rainfall, the farmland is shrinking year after year. The soil is no longer as fertile as it used to be. The small amounts of crop are by far no longer sufficient to feed a family.

“Climate change takes away our food,” a mother complains; she does not know where to get the next meal for her children. Malnutrition is widespread. CARE helps: Farmers are being trained, so that fewer families will go hungry in future, and more food will be available in the country in spite of aridity.

### SEEDS AND EARLY WARNING SYSTEMS

Improved cultivation methods and animal husbandry contribute to sustainably increasing agricultural yields in spite of water scarcity, e.g. by growing different plants, enhancing the storage of seeds and improving animal health. Moreover, early warning systems for drought and flooding are installed.

**In Chad, CARE Austria is providing help within the scope of several projects supported by the European Union (EU).** Each of them is focussing on fighting the climate crisis. One example is Lake Chad, the formerly important inland lake stretching within the region bordering Niger, Nigeria and

Cameroon. “Due to aridity, the surface of Lake Chad has decreased by 90 per cent in the past 50 years,” says Gladys Archange, Country Director of CARE in this Central African country. **“This in itself is sufficient evidence of climate change in Chad.** It affects fishermen, stockbreeders and the livelihood of the entire population. And of course, there are conflicts about the remaining resources that the lake offers.”

### EMPOWERING WOMEN

As if the difficult supply of food was not bad enough, the landlocked country is surrounded by countries where armed conflicts are raging. **Many people are seeking refuge in Chad and are in urgent need of humanitarian aid.**

Women and girls are particularly hard hit by the crisis. “It’s them who must walk ever increasing distances to get water and firewood,” says CARE aid worker Archange. “The long walks increase the danger of violence and sexual assaults. Girls who have to carry water for hours every day cannot go to school.”

**Empowering women and girls is the aim of CARE in Chad.** We are building water wells and irrigation systems, so that the water in the village will not run dry even during periods of drought. CARE instructs local teams to maintain the systems in the long term. Young women and men are getting a chance to learn craft skills. Small savings groups that also grant microcredits enable them to set up their own business.



## “WE ONLY HAVE LEAVES FOR FOOD – IF I MANAGE TO FIND ANY”

“After three days without food, I passed out with hunger,” Julienne (35) says. A neighbour gave her a bowl of rice. **“But often we do not have anything.** We eat the leaves of the cassava bush – that is if I manage to find any.”

The village community is trying to help the single mother of Telodoza (3) by buying some groceries. But most of the people in one of the poorest countries of the world have so little themselves that they can hardly afford to give to others.

**Madagascar has been suffering from hunger for years.**

Aridity and hurricanes destroy the island’s harvests. Food and clean drinking water are scarce throughout the country. But: have you ever heard about the hardship in Madagascar? There are hardly any reports in the media. Madagascar ranks first place among the ten forgotten

crises that CARE describes in its report **“Suffering in Silence”**.

**Three quarters of the population are living on less than 1.70 euros a day.** Malnutrition is widespread. Almost half of all children in Madagascar are stunted. In the past, Julienne used to work as a day laborer, earning just enough for herself and her daughter to scratch along. Then the rain stopped. The fields are drying up. The harvests are failing. There is no more work and no more food for Julienne.

The people living on the island heavily depend on crop yields. Over the past years, natural disasters, storms, pests, and droughts have become more frequent and have caused crop failures. **Madagascar is one of the countries most seriously affected by climate change.**

## SUFFERING IN SILENCE:

### THE 10 FORGOTTEN HUMANITARIAN CRISES OF THE YEAR 2019

**Which humanitarian crises hardly hit the headlines? Where are millions of people suffering in silence?**

CARE’s report “Suffering in Silence” has the answers. Analysing the year 2019, we see quite clearly that the climate plays an increasingly important role. Nine out of ten forgotten crises concern African countries – this continent is particularly hard hit by extreme weather conditions. **“Climate change further aggravates the situation,”** says Andrea Barschdorf-Hager, **Managing Director of CARE Austria.** “Armed conflicts and hunger are exacerbated by climate change.”

- 1 MADAGASCAR:** 2.6 million people **suffer from hunger.** Half of all infants are malnourished.
- 2 CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC:** 1 of every 4 is forced to flee. Half of the population **struggles to find food.**

## STOLEN CHILDHOOD

Child labour is widespread among Syrian refugees. CARE supports families so that their children can go to school.

Mohamed

Every day in the morning, the children were passing Mohamed on their way to school. He could not join them. **From 7.30 a.m. to 10.30 p.m., Mohamed was standing on the streets of Amman, selling coffee.** After the heart attack of his father, he had to leave school at the age of 12 and go to work. "I did it for my family," he tells APA. "It was not easy to see my former classmates going to school every day," Mohamed says. But the school fees and transport costs for the boy were getting too expensive, and without his income the family would have lost the apartment. For two years, he was selling coffee instead of going to school.

### NO EDUCATION FOR SYRIAN CHILDREN

**According to information of CARE, only 53.9 per cent of Syrian children go to school.** By comparison, 85 per cent of Jordanian children attend school. CARE has worked out a programme to reduce child labour in Jordan, where families are promised financial support if they send their offspring to school. A monthly amount of 70 Jordanian dinars (this money is provided by the European Commission's Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid department (ECHO)) is meant to compensate for any income lost.

Mohamed accepted the offer, because it was about the same amount he earned at the coffee stall. "I was so happy," the boy (now 15 years old) says; he is now among the best in class. Catching up after two lost years has not been easy. The boy is now the spokesman of the "Children Education Board" of CARE. **"With my contribution, I want to give other children a voice,"** Mohamed says.

Sara could have used this kind of voice when she fled from the IS stronghold of Homs to Zarqa in Jordan, all on her own together with her five children. Her 18-year-

old son was working illegally on construction sites, but was often not paid. Because the money was not enough, Sara took her daughter out of school at the age of 14, so that she could help her mother prepare traditional food for them to sell. **"I felt so guilty for having taken her out of school. After all, she wants to become a doctor,"** the Syrian woman says in tears. Two years later, Sara was told about the CARE programme by some acquaintances and registered her daughter. "She wept for joy," the woman describes the girl's happiness.

### UNCERTAIN RETURN

While 84 per cent of the Syrian refugees told CARE that one day they intend to go back, this is not going to happen for all of them. Many have started a new life in Jordan in the meantime. "We are not expecting any great departure, at least not in the next twelve months," says CARE's Jameel Dababneh. **How was life before the war?** "I cannot describe it," says Sara, the mother of five. "It was not luxurious, but I was happy."

# A POSITIVE OUTLOOK FOR RURAL REGIONS IN KOSOVO

Austria supports sustainable development in Europe's youngest state. CARE realizes local projects with 176 farming families.

Ever since 1870, the water mill of the Ivanovic family has been clattering along in the village of Terniqec east of Pristina. That's close on 150 years. The farmers living in the hilly region in eastern Kosovo have been coming here for generations to grind maize and corn. Now the Ivanovics want to invest in their historical mill and modernise their business. "We would like to market the flour on our own within the region," explains Suzana Ivanovic, whose regular occupation is that of a nurse. The premises on the old farm of the family have already been renovated in order to meet contemporary standards of hygiene. "All we need now is the packaging machine."

The family have raised EUR 3,750 in own funds for the investment. A loan from the RESI programme, which stands for Rural Economic Sustainability Initiative, supports the implementation of the family's plan.

**175 other peasant operations in Kosovo are using funds from the programme, which ran from 2016 to 2019. The funds were provided by the Austrian Development Agency (ADA).** The programme was implemented locally by CARE. RESI was aimed at sustainably promoting rural development in Kosovo. In other words: the idea was to support peasant operations to develop new value creation models, to increase their income and to create jobs.

## THRIVING PEASANTS

The deputy head of the ADA office in the capital of Pristina, Asrim Aziri, explains that after a term of three years, the programme is a big success. 935 applications for support were submitted. 176 were ultimately approved.

**Projects like the one of the miller's family Ivanovic go to show that there is a spirit of optimism in Kosovo.**

The country is the youngest state in Europe. It gained independence from Serbia only in 2008. Also from a demographic perspective, Kosovo is among the youngest states in Europe. 42 per cent of its population are younger than 25 years. At the same time, youth unem-



ployment is approx. 50 per cent. In spite of all the optimism that defines the outlook of young entrepreneurs within the RESI project, the past still constitutes a burden on the development of this young country.

## POSITIVE OUTLOOK

CARE Project Manager Faton Krasniqi is optimistic about the potential in food production: "After the war, people must learn again to put their trust in domestic products. That may take some time, even more so when you are competing with imported goods in the supermarket. But it will work out all right."

# CARE AUSTRIA STRATEGY 2020/21

Our vision is that of a world of hope, inclusion and social justice, where poverty has been overcome, and all human beings live in dignity and security. **CARE is a global leader within a worldwide movement dedicated to ending poverty.**

In 2019, we managed a total of 80 projects in 28 countries.



## WOMEN AND GIRLS

**CARE puts women and girls in the center.** Strengthening the role of women and girls is the only way to bring about changes within society that will allow women, but also men, to live in safety in the future.



## ADVOCACY

CARE is particularly committed to the following topics: **empowerment of women, climate protection and environment** as well as the Sustainable Development Goals of the UN (SDGs).



## SELF-DETERMINATION

**CARE is active around the world in order to save lives.** We consider our main task to be humanitarian aid and innovation by implementing programmes that will sustainably empower the participants, creating the greatest possible effect for them.



## PROGRAMMES

Some 57 % of project costs were spent on development cooperation and 43 % on emergency aid. Some 44.8 % of the funds were used in Africa, 33 % in the Middle East, 11.5 % in Eastern and Southern Europe, as well as 10.7 % in Asia. **In 2019, CARE Austria has managed a total of 80 projects in 28 countries.**



## MARKETING, PROGRAMME, FINANCE

Of total revenues, some 38.7 % are provided from public funds of the EU, 28.7 % through private donations, 19.7 % from domestic public funds and other proceeds, as well as 12.9 % from the release of dedicated funds not used. Some 89.6 % of total expenditure are accounted for by projects and yet unused committed funds, 8.4 % by advertising for donations and general public relations, as well as 2 % by administration.



## THE CARE PACKAGE®

CARE is independent in political, ideological and religious terms. We help people in need, with a targeted focus on supporting women and girls. **The CARE Package is more than a historical memory. In its contemporary form, it has remained part of our work until this day and is more important than ever – for instance, during the current fight against the coronavirus.**



## DISTINCTION

In 2019 again, CARE Austria was distinguished as a climate neutral location. The CO2 emissions were compensated for by way of a climate protection project in Kenya.



### How it was done:

Traditionally, people in the rural region of Siaya in the west of Kenya do their cooking on open fireplaces, consuming huge quantities of firewood. The project supports communal savings and loan associations. In this way, the women can afford to buy efficient cook stoves, in turn reducing the demand for firewood and protecting the local forests, thus **reducing CO2 emissions**. What is more: the savings associations promote the financial and social independence of the women.

**CARE Austria is proud to make a contribution to climate protection with this project.**

# THESE CHILDREN DO NOT KNOW ANYTHING BUT WAR

War. Amwag (7) and her kid brother do not remember anything else. For five years now, the war has been tearing apart their native country of Yemen. The children sell cookies in front of a school. "To help our mother," Amwag (photo) says. Her eyes are full of anxiety and despair. "Our father died four years ago," she adds.

### 80 PER CENT OF THE POPULATION NEED HELP

The suffering of the people in Yemen is immense. The figures themselves are oppressively huge. **Some 24 million people are in need of humanitarian help – that corresponds to 80 per cent of the population.** 14 million require life-saving emergency relief. Millions of refugees are seeking protection from attacks. The hunger, the search for drinking water and the spreading of diseases like cholera are inescapable wherever they go.

"We don't get much information about Yemen, although this is the world's biggest humanitarian disaster," says Jennifer Bose, who has worked in the country as an aid worker. CARE has stayed in Yemen after the war had broken out in March 2015.

**"With the aid from CARE, we can reach one million people each month," Jennifer says.** Food and drinking water are supplied to relieve the most urgent hardship. CARE also distributes seeds, installs latrines in refugee camps, repairs water extraction points that were damaged during the fighting, and restores schools that were destroyed.

For children like Rawan, your donation is vital. This girl's fate has moved CARE aid worker Jennifer deeply. She cannot forget the encounter with the 12-year-old girl in a refugee camp in Aden. Rawan is extremely undernourished; she cannot walk or speak. Her mother carried her on her back for more than two days on the way from their village to the city for her to get some help. "I saw the bones everywhere on her body," says Jennifer. **Please don't look away! You can help children like Rawan and Amwag with a CARE Package!**

### “WHO CARES ABOUT OUR FUTURE?”

This question was the initial idea for the series of workshops and the conference of **“MY FUTURE – WHO CARES?”**. From September 2019 until February 2020, more than 1,700 apprentices and high school students from Vorarlberg were discussing the 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the 11 Youth Goals in numerous workshops, campaigns and lectures.

The aim of this cooperation of the Junges Landestheater Vorarlberg with CARE Austria was to open a window to the world for young people, to hone their awareness of global challenges and to encourage them to get involved themselves. Various topics, e.g. the environment, education, poverty and inequalities, were addressed, always combined with the question: **What’s that to me personally?**

International CARE experts came to Vorarlberg to provide the students with insights into different worlds. The topics were arranged around aspects like smartphones, fast fashion, solidarity and gender justice. **On the occasion of the touching final event in February 2020, the positive energy of the young people was palpable in the sold-out Landestheater Vorarlberg.**

Encouragement and inspiration to act was additionally provided to the audience by digital expert Ingrid Brodnig (author and journalist), Anika Dafert (student and activist) and Felix Finkbeiner, founder of “Plant-for-the-Planet”. Finkbeiner shows what the initiative of one person can achieve: at the age of 10, he planted his first tree for a school assignment. In the meantime, his tree planting campaign has reached billions.

The workshop and the future conference were meant to provide encouragement to act both within the young people’s direct social environment and in a wider, global context. And that is just what the **“MY FUTURE – WHO CARES?”** initiative has accomplished.

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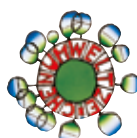
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
