Empowering women is very important to us. Learn in a report from Uganda how the way out of poverty and into self-determination can succeed.


We will not be silent when lives are at risk

Giving a future with education

In Samut Sakhon, near Bangkok, there is a CARE school that has been supported for several years with private donations from Austria. I visited personally to get an impression of this project on site.

The day center gives children of migrant workers access to education. Without this support, the children would be denied the chance to attend classes. Many people from Myanmar, Laos and Cambodia work as day laborers on construction sites or in the fish and shrimp factories in the suburbs of Bangkok. The children of these families are often not admitted to Thailand's public schools because they do not speak Thai and their parents do not have enough money to pay for the expensive learning materials. One consequence is that the young children are often left to fend for themselves during the day, and some are even forced to stay at home. The older children spend their time on the streets or work in child labor.

In the school supported by CARE, the children can learn the Thai language and additionally receive lessons in common school subjects. This prepares them for a transfer to a regular school, where they can continue their education. Currently, about one third of the students succeed in doing so.

The support of CARE Austria has already enabled hundreds of children to gain access to education. Despite the difficult circumstances, I am pleased with what has been achieved and am thrilled by the children's progress. They are given a concrete chance for their future.

The children's great joy is palpable. They know that education is the key to a better life. The school supports them on their way to realizing their dreams and goals.

Ukraine under attack

CARE in emergency action

February 24, 2022 is the day when the war on Ukraine escalated. More than 13 million Ukrainians have lost everything since then. They had to flee abroad or to less contested parts of the country.

In Ukraine, not only countless houses are destroyed. Water and electricity supplies have repeatedly been damaged and interrupted during attacks. There is still a lack of food and hygiene items. There is hardly any medical care, and medicines are hard to come by. More than 17.6 million people urgently need humanitarian aid, including 5.5 million children.

Many women have to flee alone with their children. They have to make their way along life-threatening routes while rockets are pounding and shots are ringing out around them. Previously, they held out in underground hiding places, but the fighting has not stopped.

Tetyana (31) has taken shelter in a basement for seventy days with her twelve-year-old daughter. "We cried every day because we were so scared," Tetyana recalls. They have managed to escape to the west of the country on one of the last evacuation busses. "I arrived here completely broken. I needed help and someone to talk to," Tetyana says. Tetyana finds support with a psychologist who works for one of CARE's partner organizations.

The longer the war lasts, the greater the impact on mental health. CARE therefore offers targeted psychosocial support. Many people have been through terrible experiences in the midst of fighting, hardship and fleeing to safety.

"My son and I were waiting in line to buy bread. Suddenly there were explosions around us. We ran and hid in the ditch." **Natalia** (41) has made it to Lviv with her son Tymofyi (8) and her in-laws. They are now safe. They are living together in a room in an emergency shelter set up by a local aid organization supported by CARE.

Timofyi has made friends with children whose families have also fled. In his hometown of Lysychansk, he has to leave his cats behind. He misses them very much and also the life he used to have. "My biggest wish is to go to school with my friends." Timofyi currently has only online lessons.

Natalia reports about living in constant fear. For months, there has been fighting in Luhansk every day. Gunshots and explosions are heard again and again. When the family has to flee, there is only a short time to prepare. "I didn't know how to pack my whole life into a single suitcase," Natalia says. Her mother-in-law Nelly (71) even forgets her dentures in the rush to leave.

The aid organization supported by CARE offers psychosocial help to refugee families. This is urgently needed. "The people in Ukraine have experienced unimaginable suffering over the past year. They not only have to leave their belongings behind, but often also loved ones. Countless have lost their lives," says Andrea Barschdorf-Hager, Managing Director of CARE Austria.

For many people, fear and worry are the new reality of life. "They live in constant tension. Added to this is the uncertainty that something terrible could happen any day. All this exerts enormous stress," says psychologist Inna Kanivets. She works at an aid facility in Cherkasy. "Many people we talk to have major family crises to deal with," Kanivets says. CARE will continue to help them cope wherever possible.

How we left violence and hardship behind

Exploitation and violence against women and girls is a major problem in Uganda. Women have little access to economic resources and bear the brunt of poverty. They must overcome greater odds to earn a living and be independent. That's where the Women and Youth Resilience Project (WAYREP), funded by the Austrian Development Agency and CARE Austria, comes in.

Women and girls are empowered socially and economically – for example through small savings groups and training. The goal is for their voices to finally be heard and for them to lead a life free of violence.

Lily Rose, Joan and Florence have been able to change their lives for the better with CARE's support.

Lily Rose Auma (58) is chair of the small savings group "Bed Ki Gen" ("Have Faith") and runs a small farm. "I often was not taken seriously by others because I couldn't find a new husband as a single parent. It was hard for me to deal with that. So when I joined 'Bed Ki Gen,' I not only received financial training but also counseling on gender-based violence, which includes emotional violence. The savings group helped me heal and become a better person."

When her husband died in 2007, Janet Oroma, 42, a mother of three, lost social acceptance. By joining a small savings group, she regained hope: "I cried a lot because I was afraid I wouldn't be able to afford my deaf child's tuition. At that point, I was

Breaking the Silence

In 2022, the war in Ukraine dominated the global headlines. **But there are millions of people suffering without the world public noticing, and where are they?** Based on an analysis of more than 5.8 million online articles worldwide, CARE's "Breaking the Silence" report highlights those ten humanitarian crises that are barely talked about.

"We see it as our mission to show the 'silent' crises, even though there is a high need in reporting and the state of the world as a whole," says Andrea Barschdorf-Hager, executive director of CARE Austria. "We call the report 'Breaking the Silence' because it is high time that these crises are talked about. **We cannot and will not remain silent when lives are at risk.**"

This time, all of the countries whose residents do not receive the world's attention are located in Africa. What they mostly have in common is that they are already being hit with the full force of the consequences of the climate crisis. Hunger, which could previously be pushed back for years, is also back in many of these crises.

The effects of the war in Ukraine in 2022 made life difficult for millions of people. Disrupted supply chains led to a spike in food prices and a global crisis. The number of hungry people increased from 811 to 828 million.

very unhappy and drained. I joined a small savings group run by CARE in 2020. And I received psycho-social support, made new friends who I could talk to, and learned how to manage my finances. In the meantime, I even run a small business."

Florence Ayamo (32) has moved in with her boyfriend in her early 20s to a place where she didn't know the language. She was isolated and had no one there for her except her partner. But he often left her alone and drank too much. "The small savings group changed my life. I learned to talk to my boyfriend about the negative impact his drinking was having on our relationship," Florence says. "We now know how to deal with conflict. In the group, I have also found many valuable friends who strengthen and support me. I am so grateful to CARE for that."

CARE's 2030 goal is to advance gender equality for 50 million women and girls, promote their rights, and combat gender-based violence.

The school of little Jordão Saraiva from Mozambique has been destroyed by a tropical cyclone. His homeland is particularly hit hard by the effects of climate change. Time and again, cyclones sweep across entire swaths of land, leaving a trail of devastation in their wake. Schools, medical facilities and homes are razed to the ground within seconds. **Only rapid reconstruction ensures that children have access to education and health care and that the people affected have a roof over their heads.** In Mozambique, CARE provides aid after every tropical storm with the support of the EU.

This is also the case in Mandama, the home of Jordão. The village's old school building is made of wood, which offers no protection against the strong winds. "Many of our students simply didn't feel safe here," says teacher Ismael Mahando. The new school is therefore constructed from climate-resistant and particularly stable materials. The building is intended to provide shelter for the general population during heavy rains and storms. During Cyclone Gombe in March 2022, for example, the entire community gathered here.

And the children also seem very happy with the new school building. "This school will certainly not be destroyed by a cyclone. I like coming here now," says Nora, a student at Mandama Elementary School. Long-term and, above all, regular school attendance has a positive impact on the future of all students. CARE's goal is to support people on their self-determined path.

CARE has built two schools with sanitary facilities for a total of 800 children with the help of the EU.

Jordão, who currently attends the third grade, also has a plan. "When I grow up, I want to be a teacher so I can teach others what I have learned." Perhaps he will teach his favorite subject, math.

The European Union and CARE are helping people rebuild resilient infrastructure that provides protection against natural disasters like hurricanes. Residents of 15 communities in the provinces of Cabo Delgado and Nampula are gaining access to knowledge and techniques that will help them better withstand weather extremes. In Nampula, CARE has built two schools with sanitary facilities for a total of 800 children.

Young Men Initiative (YMI) is a flagship project of CARE that accompanies young people on their way to life as adults.

Young Men Initiative

It started in 2006 with a small study that examines attitudes and behaviors of young men in countries in the Balkans. In more than 15 years, the Young Men Initiative (YMI) has become a flagship CARE project that accompanies young people on their way to adult life. For some time now, it has not only targeted male adolescents, but has also included girls and young women.

Since its beginning, the YMI program and its successor projects have worked directly with more than 130,000 young people in over 280 schools. It is being implemented in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Serbia, Croatia, Kosovo and Albania. More than 1,800 teachers have since been involved. Through various educational activities and campaigns, YMI has reached more than 800,000 people throughout the Balkans. This figure is obtained by adding the families of the young people and other target groups such as educators, students and, journalists to the project who have contributed to make it so successful. **Since 2013 and until today, it has been funded by the Austrian Development Agency (ADA) as part of the Austrian Development Cooperation.**

"Working with young people, especially young men, for gender equality has been an extraordinary challenge," says Sumka Bučan, Country Director of CARE Balkans. YMI works to help with the transition from home to adulthood, while young people are exposed to a mix of social, cultural, educational and economic influences and must find their way. "The program also includes complementary aspects such as the promotion of healthy lifestyles, education on non-violence and the opportunity to help create campaigns that teach ownership," says Bučan.

What has remained the same from the beginning is the goal of developing an alternative to conflict resolution through violence with young people and advancing gender equality. The project strengthens life skills and stimulates positive developments in the participants. We work with young people

to promote their personal, social and educational development and enable them to discover and take their place in society as they transition into adulthood.

The YMI follow-up project "Youth Creates the Future" is currently running in countries in the Western Balkans. It offers support that education and social systems cannot provide in this way. There is a lot of strain on young people due to pressure of high unemployment in the region, outdated role models of men and women in society, violence in their everyday life, for example on the way to and from school, in the family and in the media, as well as the risk of radicalization. With "Youth Creates the Future", young people can create a positive and non-violent counter-design to the aforementioned.

Why the Sustainable Development Goals are more important than ever before

"The Sustainable Development Goals reflect a global vision of a better world of dignity, equality, sustainability and prosperity for all," says Sofia Sprechmann Sineiro, Secretary General of CARE International. "These aspirations not only unite and inspire us, but also provide a common framework."

How can we achieve positive change in a world in crisis? The plan is contained in the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) agreed by world leaders in 2015. They represent our shared global commitment to change. As a humanitarian organization, CARE is committed to contributing to the SDGs in all of our projects.

Gender equality is at the heart of CARE's work. We are committed to prioritizing it in everything we do. We see the women's voice and agency as a central approach to contributing to all other SDGs.

In 2022, CARE Austria worked on 30 projects that addressed **gender equality (SDG 5)**. We supported women and girls in 18 countries. A key component of SDG 5 is to empower women against gender-based violence (GBV). We have helped change attitudes about gender-based violence and reduce the extent of it. We also provide support and assistance to women who have experienced violence.

No poverty (SDG 1) was the focus of 25 projects. **CARE Austria provided humanitarian assistance to people in need in 17 countries.** CARE's goal is to fight malnutrition and hunger and

to provide people with access to drinking water and adequate sanitation. In addition to providing emergency relief after disasters, we focus on long-term interventions such as repairing or building water supply systems in rural communities.

Good health and well-being (SDG 3) were the focus of 22 projects in 15 countries. Since the onset of the global health crisis in 2020, CARE Austria provided financial support and assistance in the response to COVID-19. Health is essential for sustainable development.

The task has never been easy, but we face even greater challenges in the years remaining until 2030. We are not yet

halfway there, but seem to be even further from it due to numerous crises. There is no doubt that the SDGs are at great risk. COVID-19 has had a devastating impact. The consequences of climate change are accelerating and conflicts are placing an additional burden on millions of people around the world. The pandemic has reversed progress in the fight against poverty. Heat waves, droughts, forest fires and floods affect more and more people every year. The war in Ukraine has led to unprecedented increases in food and fuel prices around the world.

CARE Austria will remain committed to the SDGs as guiding principles of our work. **The SDGs are our guide out of global crises and towards positive change that will last beyond our lifetime.**

In Austria, as of 2014, he has succeeded in making a new start as a poet and writer. Omar Khir Alanam also works in schools with young people. Often it is about prejudices, identity and belonging.

“Being Austrian is a feeling,” says Omar Khir Alanam. "Only I can give that to myself, but no one can take that away from me neither." For him, Austrian citizenship comes with a mission. "I want to be an active part of society and shape it," he says. For him, integration is a term that is not clearly defined. "We all have to integrate into a new situation again and again," Omar Khir Alanam finds. After the severe earth-quake in Türkiye and his birth country Syria, Andrea Barschdorf-Hager had a second conversation with him for a podcast. "The images after the earthquake in Syria remind me of the war as I experienced it," says Omar Khir Alanam noticeably moved. "Back then, too, families were searching for their loved ones in rubble and ruins."

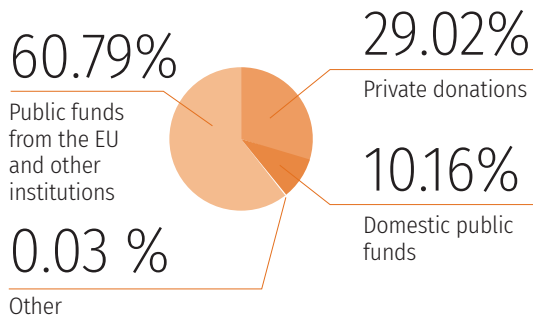

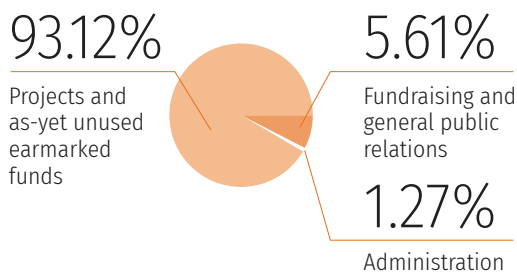

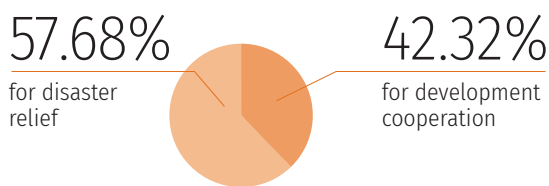
Revenues according to their origin



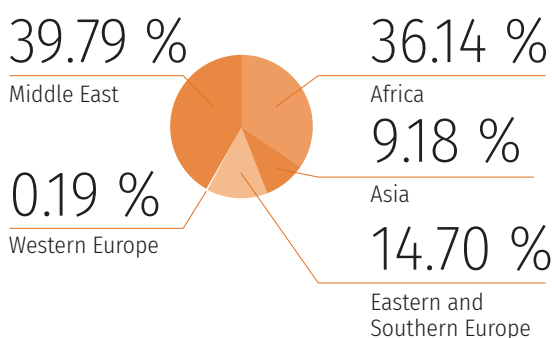
Expenditures according to their use

Women and girls

CARE puts women and girls at the center. Only the empowerment of women and girls can bring about social change that provides a secure future for women, as well as men.

Advocacy

CARE is particularly concerned with the following issues: empowering women, protecting the climate and environment, and the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Self-determined life

CARE is on a global mission to save lives. We see our mission primarily in humanitarian aid and innovation in implementing programs that are sustainably empowering and achieve the greatest possible impact for those who participate in them.

Programs

Of the project effort, approximately 57.68 percent was used for disaster relief and 42.32 percent for development cooperation. Of the funds, 39.79 percent were spent in the Middle East, 36.14 percent in Africa, 9.18 percent in Asia, 14.70 percent in Eastern and Southern Europe, and 0.19 percent in Western Europe. CARE Austria managed a total of 65 projects in 31 countries in 2022.

Marketing, programs, finance

Of the total revenue, about 60.79 percent came from EU public funds and other institutions, 29.02 percent from private donations, 10.16 percent from domestic public funds and 0.03 percent from other revenues.

Of the total expenses, about 93.12 percent were spent on projects and as-yet unused earmarked funds, 5.61 percent on fundraising and general public relations, and 1.27 percent on administration.

CARE Austria is climate neutral

As in previous years, CARE Austria offset 36 tons of CO₂ through the organization "atmosfair". This contribution supports climate protection projects in Nigeria, India and Kenya.

CARE Austria also offsets via the organization "turn to zero" and is also involved in the CARE project "BACHAT" (Gold Standard) in India, which promotes efficient cooking systems for households.

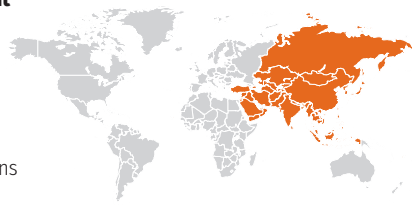
